
UTAH SYMPHONY OPEN REHEARSAL INFORMATION

BEFORE THE REHEARSAL:

 Open Rehearsals are held at Maurice Abravanel Hall in downtown Salt Lake City.

• Utah Symphony performs in this hall almost every weekend from September through May.


 This hall is named after Maurice Abravanel who conducted Utah Symphony for over 30 years.



BEFORE THE REHEARSAL: GETTING TO THE BUILDING

 One week before the Open Rehearsal you will be Emailed directions on which door you will enter through.


 You will either enter through the glass doors found on the east side or west side of the building.



BEFORE THE REHEARSAL: IN THE LOBBY

 You will see a large, 27-foot-tall glass sculpture titled *The* Olympic Tower by Dale
 Chihuly.


• The Olympic Tower is made of 1,276 pieces of blown glass and it can be taken apart for cleaning.



BEFORE THE REHEARSAL: FINDING YOUR SEAT

• There are stairs that lead to three higher levels, these are known as "tiers." Symphony Staff will tell you where your seats are.


 You might sit on the ground level or you might go up to one of the tiers. All of the seats have great views.



BEFORE THE REHEARSAL: FINDING THE RESTROOMS

• The ground level restrooms are on the west side of the lobby down the steps/escalator.


• If you are seated in the tiers you do not need to go to the ground level as there are restrooms on each tier.



BEFORE THE REHEARSAL: INSIDE THE HALL

• The hall is inside a thick cement box to keep noise out; however, you will not see any cement inside the hall as the walls are covered with wood panels.

• There are 2,766 seats and above your seat you will see 6 chandeliers. Each chandelier is 16' x 16' and has 3,000 hand-cut Bohemian crystals.



DURING THE REHEARSAL: ABOUT THE MUSICIANS

- There are 89 full-time musicians in Utah Symphony and they come from all over the world.
- Each musician has auditioned to be in the orchestra. There are usually a couple hundred people auditioning for one spot.
- This rehearsal is part of the musicians' full-time job, you are watching them work.



DURING THE REHEARSAL: WHAT TO EXPECT

- Since this is a working rehearsal the conductor chooses what they would like to rehearse.
- The conductor may run the entire piece, start at different places, or start and stop in different sections.
- You may not hear the program in concert order and you may not even hear everything on the program.




DURING THE REHEARSAL: CONCERT ETIQUETTE

• Listen quietly and do not distract those around you.

No food or drink inside the hall.

• No recording of any kind is allowed.

• Please silence all eletronic devices.



DURING THE REHEARSAL: WHEN TO CLAP

- Unlike a concert do not clap when the conductor stops the group.
- Applause can interrupt the conductor trying to give feedback to the orchestra.
- You may clap if the musicians onstage are applauding for a soloist.
- Clapping at the very end of rehearsal is a great way to show your appreciation.
